



Overview of fees for pastus⁺ licencees

with right to use the sign as from 1 January 2020

Companies which have concluded a licence contract with AMA-Marketing and thus acquired the right to use the sign pastus⁺ must pay annual licence fees.

The annual licence fee refers to the respective calendar year and is calculated according to the calculation formula below:

Sales level	Total sales in the animal feed sector* (sum of all business premises)	net amount
	< EUR 0.5 m	EUR 200.00
	< EUR 5.0 m	EUR 450.00
	< EUR 20 m	EUR 750.00
	< EUR 20 m	EUR 1,000.00
Business premises	Business premises in the animal feed sector	Net amount
	Per business premise of companies with an animal feed turnover ≥ EUR 5.0 m	EUR 100.00
	Per subsidiary and per business premises of companies with an animal feed turnover < EUR 5.0 m	EUR 15.00

* Annual turnover generated with animal feed, whether or not it is marketed under the pastus+ sign.

If the contract is concluded, terminated or cancelled during the year, the licence fee will only be charged for those months of the year in which a valid licence agreement relationship existed.

Example: *valid contract as of 15 July.* ⇒ *Licence fee is charged for July to December*

termination as per 3 January. ⇒ *Licence fee for January is credited*

Examples for the calculation of the annual pastus[⊕] licence fee:

Example (1):

Feed business with two business premises

Company data		Net amount
Total turnover generated by animal feed	< EUR 20 m	EUR 750.00
Number of business premises	2 (total turnover ≥ EUR 5.0 m)	EUR 200.00
Annual licence fee:		EUR 950.00

Example (2):

Animal feed company with two business premises

Company data		Net amount
Total turnover generated by animal feed	< EUR 0.5 m	EUR 200.00
Number of business premises	1 (total turnover ≥ EUR 0.5 m)	EUR 15.00
Annual licence fee:		EUR 215.00
